With buzzy restaurants and dynamic art exhibitions, this laid-back San Diego surf town has a new cosmopolitan side. *By Maya Kroth*



The virgin surfs

The 10- by 10-foot mosaic *The Surfing Madonna*, depicting the Virgin of Guadalupe carving a wave, was created in 2011 by artist Mark Patterson, who installed it guerrilla-style under a railroad bridge. City officials ordered it removed, but Cafe Ipé rescued the work last summer. You can pay homage to it on the cafe patio. \$; 970 N. Coast Hwy. 101; (760) 436-2233.

A happier happy hour

Behind a facade of giant roll-up garage doors that open onto the street, Union Kitchen & Tap has a rotating selection of local brews and creative cocktails like the blackberry mojito, made with fresh mint grown in the adjacent garden. Meanwhile, at Solace & The Moonlight Lounge, a portrait of The Dude from *The* Big Lebowski presides over the bar, which draws an after-work crowd. Happy-hour highlights include chef Matt Gordon's peel-and-eat shrimp and chipotle-infused Bloody Marys made from natural ingredients down to the organic, vegan Worcestershire-style sauce. Nearby, Elizabethan Desserts turns out a daily selection of treats to rival Grandma's, from strawberry whoopie pies and churro cupcakes to crumbly, buttery berry buckle. Fancy coffee has finally arrived

At the locally owned Lofty
Coffee Co., you can feel good
about the ethics behind your
cardamom-infused Turkish
latte or ancho chile-spiked
Aztec mocha; it's all organic,
fair-trade, and small-farm

grown. Diet-sensitive types will appreciate the selection of gluten-free treats and alternative milks (soy, almond, and coconut). For coffee nuts, there is the required pour-over cup or cold-brewed iced coffee. \$; 90 N. Coast Hwy. 101; loftycoffee co.com.

Hang out with the artists

Longtime artist and gallery director Reesey Shaw founded Lux Art Institute in 1998 to give audiences a chance to interact with a resident artist at work. Her modern, LEED-certified institute has a studio and gallery upstairs and an apartment downstairs, where the artists live during three-to six-week residencies (this summer's live-in is Whitney Biennial alum Melissa Miller).

"It's quite magical to see a 3-year-old's eyes pop as they watch someone make a painting or a sculpture," Shaw says. \$5; Thu-Sat; 1550 S. El Camino Real; luxartinstitute.org.
